

Summary

Week 6/2022 (07 February – 13 February 2022)

- Albania, Estonia, Norway, Republic of Moldova and Slovakia reported widespread geographic influenza activity and/or at least medium influenza intensity.
- 6% of all sentinel primary care specimens from patients presenting with ILI or ARI symptoms tested positive for an influenza virus.
- Six countries reported seasonal influenza activity at or above 10% positivity in sentinel primary care: Serbia (70%), Hungary (34%), France (28%), Luxembourg (11%), Republic of Moldova (11%) and Sweden (10%).
- Both influenza type A and type B viruses were detected, with A(H3) viruses being dominant across all monitoring systems.
- Hospitalized cases with confirmed influenza virus infection were reported from intensive care units (4 type A viruses and 1 type B virus), other wards (10 type A viruses) and SARI surveillance (6 type A viruses).

2021-2022 season overview

- For the Region as a whole influenza activity started to increase in week 49/2021, with different levels of activity observed between the countries and areas of the Region, and a general dominance of A(H3) viruses though some countries reported both A(H3) and A(H1)pdm09 viruses, e.g. France.
- To date this season, the highest percentage positivity of influenza viruses in sentinel primary care specimens from patients presenting with ILI or ARI symptoms was 20% in week 52/2021.
- During the influenza Vaccine Composition Meeting for the southern hemisphere 2022 season, held in September 2021, WHO recommended updating of the A(H3N2) and the B/Victoria-lineage components. The full report can be found [here](#).
- Vaccination remains the best protective measure for prevention of influenza. With increased circulation of influenza virus clinicians should

consider early antiviral treatment of patients in at-risk groups with influenza virus infection, according to local guidance, to prevent severe outcomes. Viruses analyzed so far have remained susceptible to neuraminidase inhibitors and baloxavir marboxil.

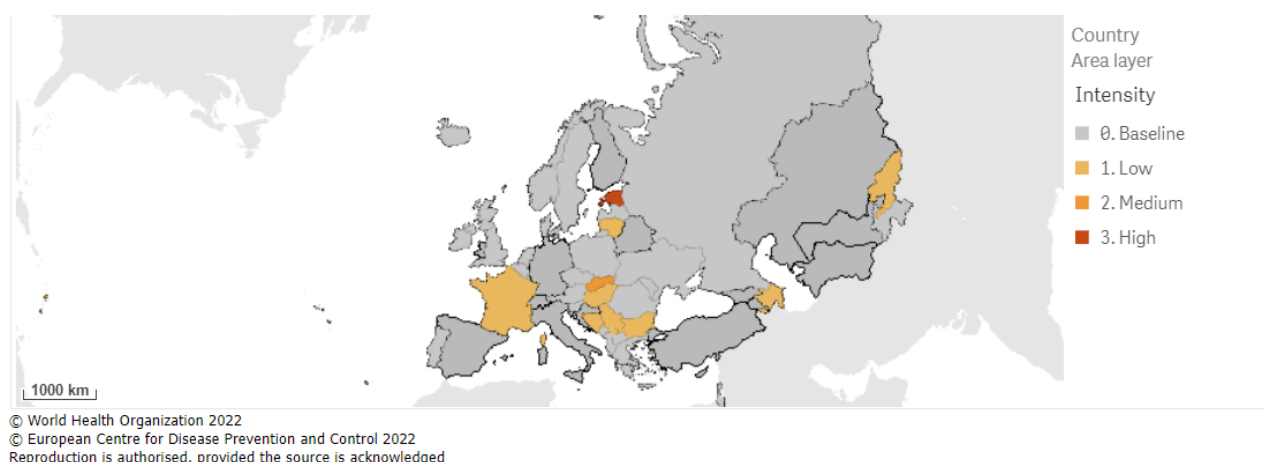

Qualitative indicators

For week 6/2022, of 38 countries and areas reporting on intensity of influenza activity, 27 reported baseline-intensity (across the Region), 9 reported low-intensity (across the Region), 1 reported medium-intensity (Slovakia) and 1 reported high-intensity (Estonia) (Fig. 1).

Of 38 countries and areas reporting on geographic spread of influenza viruses, 6 reported no activity (Czechia, Iceland, Poland, Tajikistan, Ukraine and United Kingdom (Northern Ireland)), 21 reported sporadic spread (across the Region), 3 reported local spread (North Macedonia, Serbia and Slovakia), 4 reported regional spread (France, Hungary, Kosovo (in accordance with UN Security Council Resolution 1244 (1999)) and Kyrgyzstan) and 4 reported widespread activity (Albania, Estonia, Norway and Republic of Moldova) (Fig. 2).

Figure 1. Intensity of influenza activity in the European Region, week 6/2022

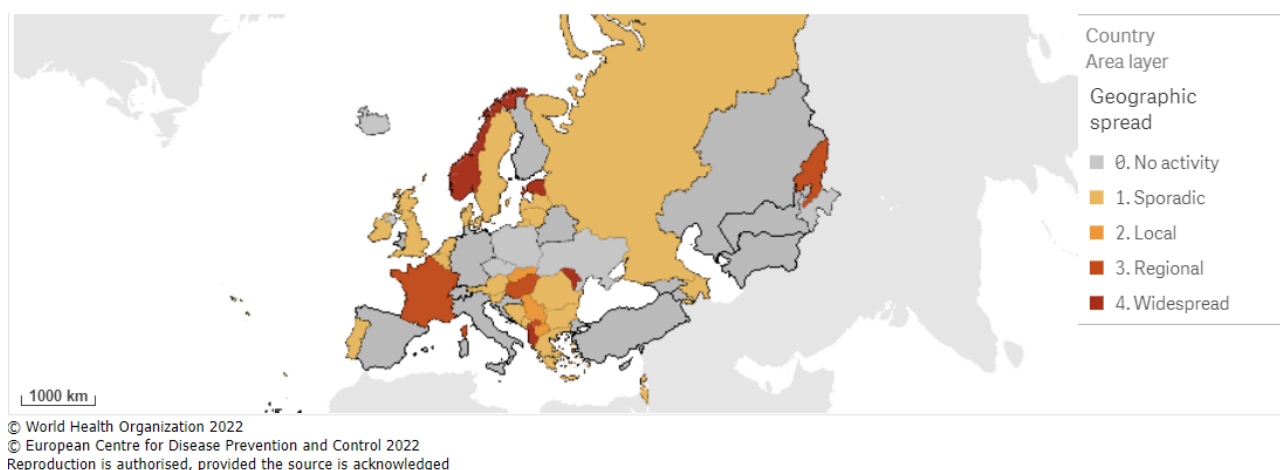

Please note:

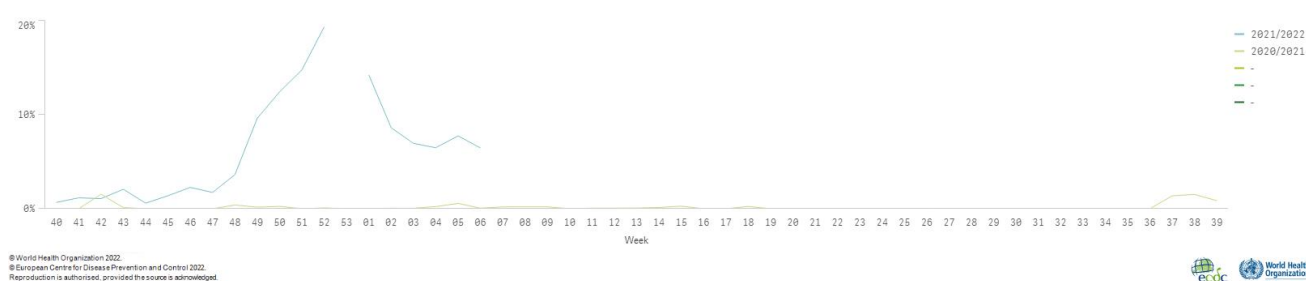
- Assessment of the intensity of activity indicator includes consideration of ILI or ARI rates. These ILI or ARI rates might be driven by respiratory infections other than influenza virus, including SARS-CoV-2, leading to observed increases in the absence of influenza virus detections.
- Assessment of intensity and geographic spread indicators includes consideration of sentinel and non-sentinel influenza virus detection data.

Non-sentinel influenza virus detections, often higher, might translate into reporting of elevated geographic spread even in the absence of sentinel detections.

Influenza positivity

For the European Region, influenza virus positivity in sentinel primary care specimens was 6%, having fallen below the Regional epidemic threshold which is set at 10% (Fig. 3).

External data sources

Mortality monitoring:

Overall pooled EuroMOMO estimates of all-cause mortality for the participating European countries showed a substantial elevated excess mortality over the two recent months, though levels have been decreasing since December 2021 in all age groups. Data from 26 European countries or subnational regions were included in this week's pooled analysis of all-cause mortality.

Primary care data

Syndromic surveillance data

Of the countries and areas in which thresholds for ILI activity are defined, countries in eastern (n=3; Azerbaijan, Tajikistan and Ukraine), northern (n=1; Estonia), southern (n=1; Serbia) and western (n=5; Austria, Belgium, Hungary,

Luxembourg and Switzerland) areas of the European Region reported activity above baseline levels.

Of the countries and areas in which thresholds for ARI activity are defined, countries in eastern (n=2; Kyrgyzstan and Russian Federation), northern (n=3; Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania), southern (n=1; Albania) and western (n=1; Slovakia) areas of the European Region reported activity above baseline levels.

Please note:

- Assessment of the syndromic surveillance data of ILI or ARI rates, as well as excess mortality, might be driven by respiratory infections other than influenza virus, including SARS-CoV-2, leading to observed increases in the absence of influenza virus detections. The thresholds mentioned are related to the Moving Epidemic Method (MEM) and based on historic ILI/ARI data.

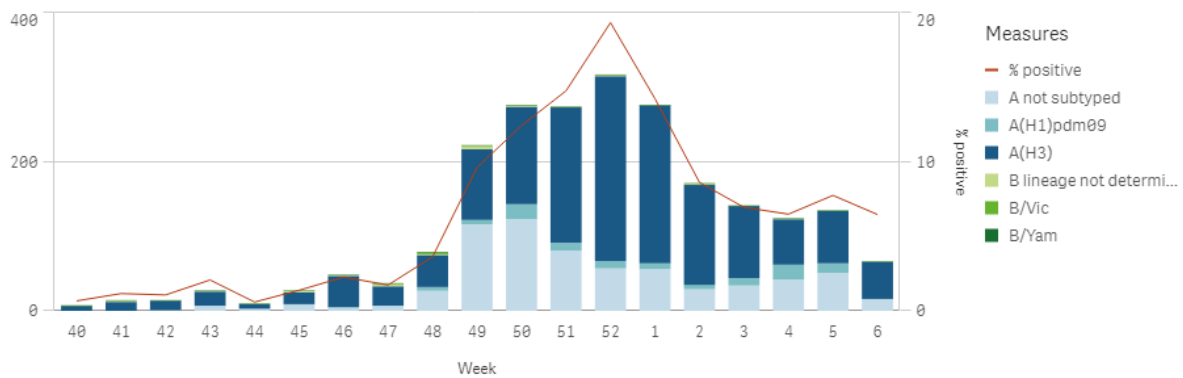
Viruses detected in sentinel-source specimens (ILI and ARI)

For week 6/2022, 66 (6%) of 1 021 sentinel specimens tested positive for an influenza virus; all were type A. Of 50 subtyped A viruses, all were subtype A(H3) (Fig. 4 and Table 1). Of 21 countries or areas across the Region that each tested at least 10 sentinel specimens in week 6/2022, 6 reported a rate of influenza virus detections at or above 10% (median 20%; range 10% - 70%): Serbia (70%), Hungary (34%), France (28%), Luxembourg (11%), Republic of Moldova (11%) and Sweden (10%).

For the season to date, 2 265 (7%) of 33 589 sentinel specimens tested positive for an influenza virus. More influenza type A (n=2 236, 99%) than type B (n=29, 1%) viruses have been detected. Of 1 574 subtyped A viruses, 1 464 (93%) were A(H3) and 110 (7%) were A(H1)pdm09. Of 5 influenza type B viruses ascribed to a lineage, all were B/Victoria (83% of type B viruses were reported without a lineage) (Fig. 4 and Table 1).

Hospital surveillance

A subset of countries and areas monitor severe disease related to influenza virus infection by surveillance of 1) hospitalized laboratory-confirmed influenza cases

in ICUs or other wards, or 2) severe acute respiratory infection (SARI; mainly in the eastern part of the Region).

Laboratory-confirmed hospitalized cases

1.1) Hospitalized laboratory-confirmed influenza cases – ICUs

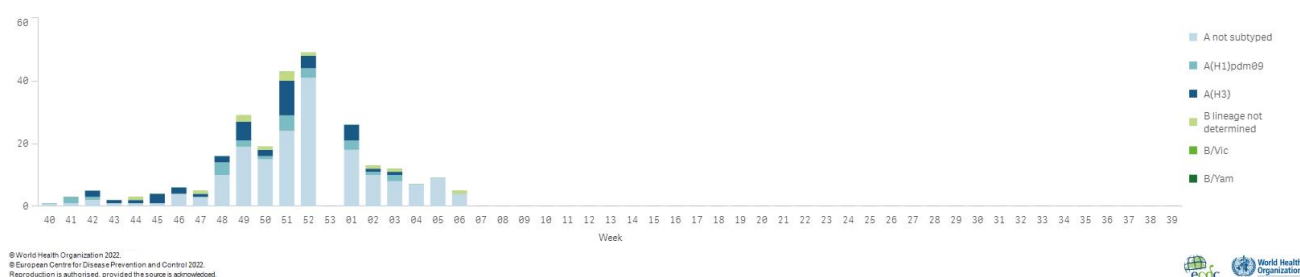
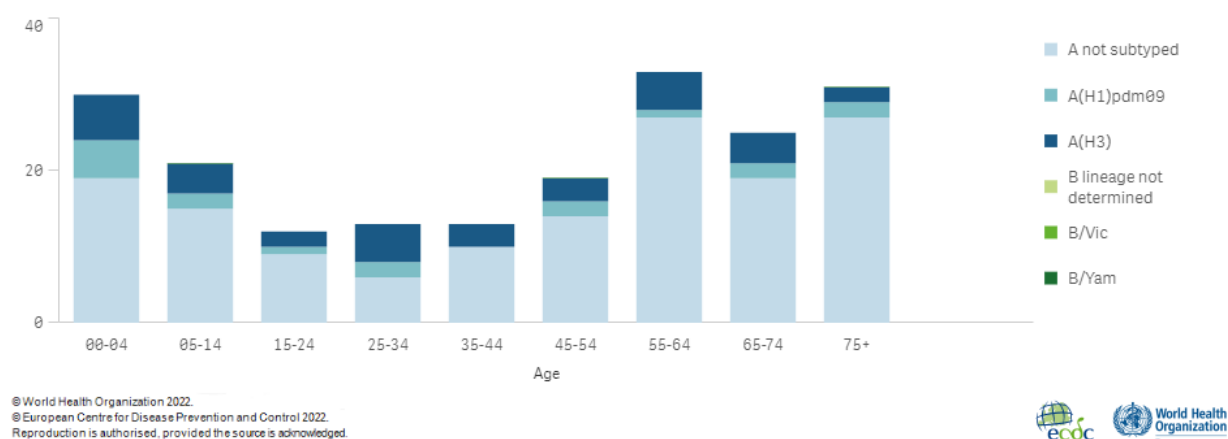


Figure 6. Distribution of influenza virus types, subtypes/lineages by age group in intensive care units (ICU), WHO European Region, season 2021/2022

For week 6/2022, 5 laboratory-confirmed influenza cases were reported from ICU wards (in France, Ireland and United Kingdom (England)). The patients were infected with influenza A viruses (n=4) and influenza B virus (n=1) (Fig. 5 and 6).

Since week 40/2021, more influenza type A (n=245, 95.3%) than type B (n=12, 4.7%) viruses were detected. Of 66 subtyped influenza A viruses, 36% were A(H1)pdm09 and 64% were A(H3). No influenza B viruses were ascribed to a lineage. Of 197 cases with known age, 90 were 15-64 years old, 56 were 65 years and older, 30 were 0-4 years old and 21 were 5-14 years old.

1.2) Hospitalized laboratory-confirmed influenza cases – other wards

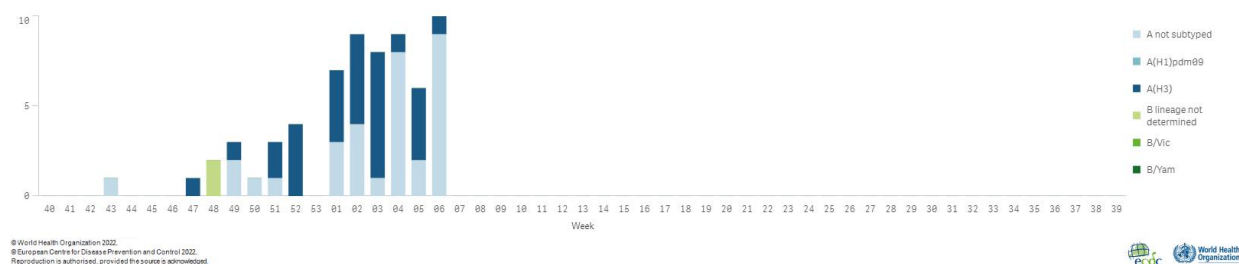
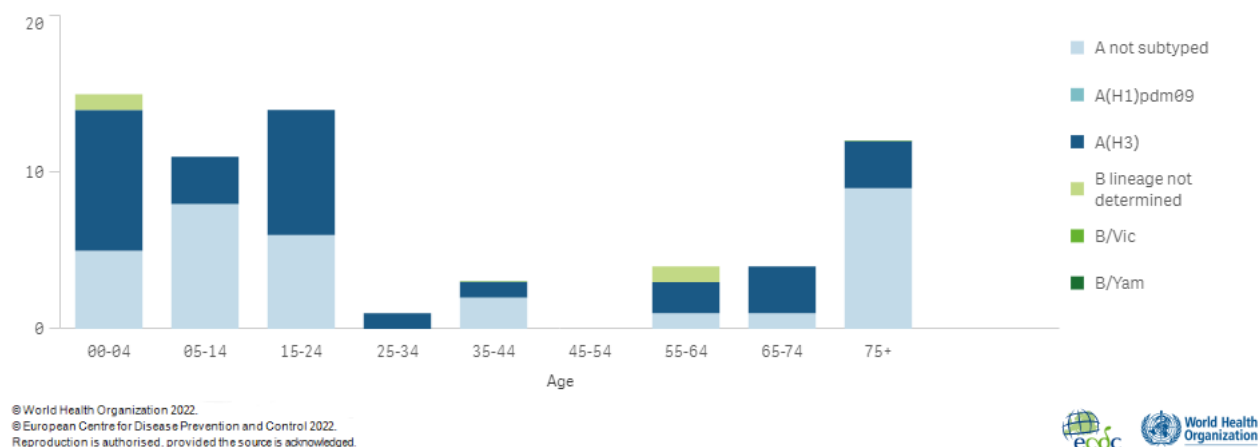


Figure 8. Distribution of influenza virus types, subtypes/lineages by age group in wards other than intensive care units (non-ICU), WHO European Region, season 2021/2022

For week 6/2022, 10 laboratory-confirmed influenza cases were reported from other wards (in Ireland). The patients were infected with influenza A viruses, with 1 subtyped as A(H3) (Fig. 7 and 8).

Since week 40/2021, 62 influenza type A viruses and 2 influenza type B viruses were detected. Of 30 subtyped influenza A viruses, all were A(H3). The 64 patients fell in 4 age groups: 22 were 15-64 years old, 16 were 65 years and older, 15 were 0-4 years old and 11 were 5-14 years old.

Severe acute respiratory infection (SARI)-based hospital surveillance

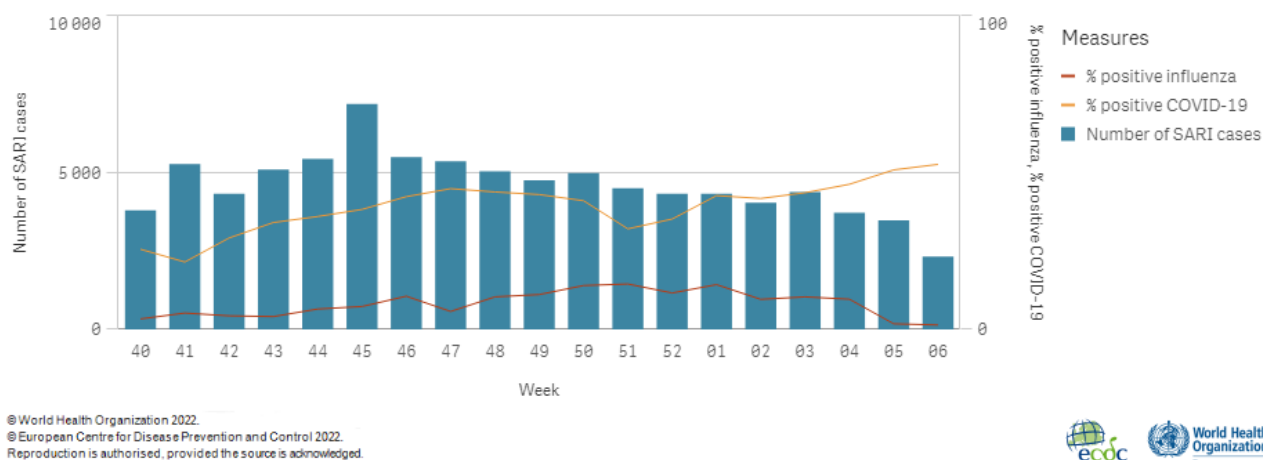
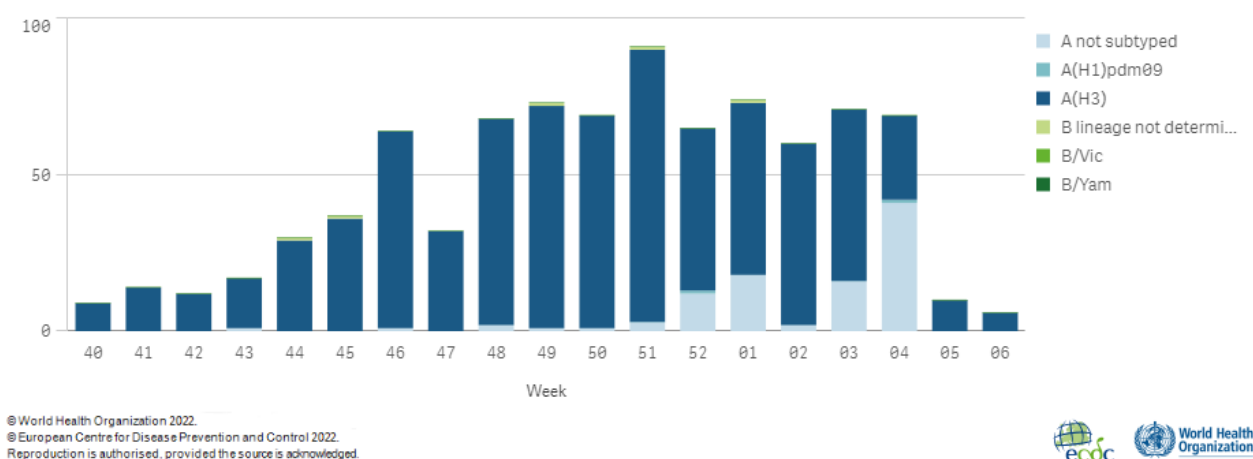


Figure 10. Influenza virus detections by type, subtype/lineage from severe acute respiratory infection (SARI), WHO European Region, season 2021/2022

For week 6/2022, 2 323 SARI cases were reported by 9 countries or areas (Albania, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Lithuania, Republic of Moldova, Russian Federation, Serbia, Spain and Ukraine). Of 425 specimens tested for influenza viruses, 1% (n=6) were positive, all of which were type A (Fig. 9 and Fig. 10). The highest positivity rates for influenza viruses were reported by Lithuania (33%), Serbia (33%) and Republic of Moldova (25%).

For the season, 87 882 SARI cases were reported by 19 countries or areas (Albania, Armenia, Belarus, Georgia, Germany, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Lithuania, Malta, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Republic of Moldova, Russian Federation, Serbia, Spain, Turkey, Ukraine, Uzbekistan and Kosovo (in accordance with Security Council resolution 1244 (1999)). For SARI cases testing positive for influenza virus since week 40/2021, type A viruses have been the most common (n=871, 99%). For 768 cases where influenza virus subtyping was performed, 766 were infected by A(H3) viruses and 2 were infected by A(H1)pdm09. Of the 5 influenza B viruses detected, none were ascribed to a lineage (Fig. 10).

Virus characteristics

Details of the distribution of viruses detected in sentinel-source specimens can be found in the [Primary care data](#) section.

Non-sentinel virologic data

For week 6/2022, 1 283 of 90 617 specimens from non-sentinel sources (such as hospitals, schools, primary care facilities not involved in sentinel surveillance, or nursing homes and other institutions) tested positive for an influenza virus; 1 233 (96%) were type A and 50 (4%) were type B. Of 261 subtyped A viruses,

216 (83%) were A(H3) and 45 (17%) were A(H1)pdm09. The 1 type B virus ascribed to a lineage was Victoria lineage (Fig. 11 and Table 2).

For the season to date, more influenza type A (n=35 739, 96%) than type B (n=1 480, 4%) viruses have been detected. Of 12 998 subtyped A viruses, 12 238 (94%) were A(H3) and 760 (6%) were A(H1)pdm09. Of 8 influenza type B viruses ascribed to a lineage, all were B/Victoria (99% of type B viruses were reported without a lineage) (Fig. 11 and Table 2).

Figure 11. Influenza virus detections by type, subtype/lineage and week, non-sentinel sources, WHO European Region, season 2021/2022

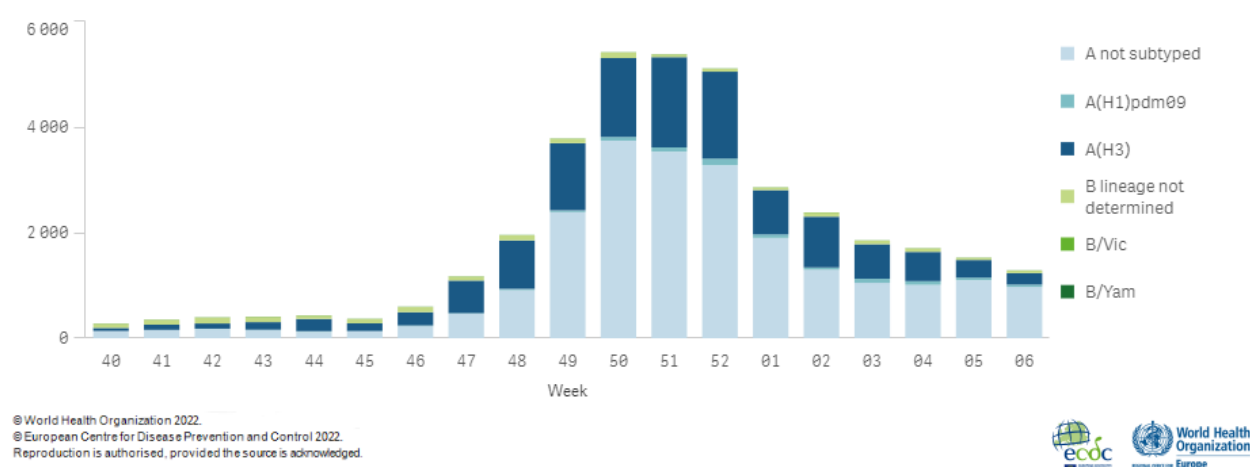

Genetic characterization

Up to week 6/2022, 772 A(H3) viruses had been characterized genetically, of which 766 were attributed to clade 3C.2a1b.2a.2 and 6 to clade 3C.2a1b.1a. Forty-eight A(H1)pdm09 viruses were characterized genetically, of which 40 were attributed to clade 6B.1A.5a.1 and 8 to clade 6B.1A.5a.2. Up to week 6/2022 six B/Victoria viruses were characterized genetically, 1 belonging to clade V1A.3 and 5 to clade V1A.3a.2.

ECDC published the [December](#) virus characterization report: Currently type A influenza virus circulation is dominating over type B, due mainly to A(H3) viruses. Vaccination remains the best protective measure for prevention of influenza. However, the predominant H3N2 viruses in circulation are not well recognised by post-infection ferret antisera raised against viruses genetically and antigenically similar to the vaccine virus, indicating antigenic diversity. It is feasible that the A(H3) vaccine component may induce less good recognition of the prevalent A(H3) viruses. Clinicians should therefore consider early antiviral treatment of at-risk groups with influenza infection, according to local guidance, to prevent severe outcomes. Antiviral susceptibility of seasonal influenza viruses

Up to week 6/2022, 853 viruses were assessed for susceptibility to neuraminidase inhibitors (562 A(H3), 27 A(H1)pdm09 and 1 B virus genotypically and 255 A(H3), 5 A(H1)pdm09 and 3 B viruses phenotypically), and 385 viruses were assessed for susceptibility to baloxavir marboxil (362 A(H3), 22 A(H1)pdm09 and 1 B virus genotypically). Phenotypically no viruses with reduced susceptibility were identified and genotypically no markers associated with reduced susceptibility were identified.

Vaccine

Results from a controlled, randomised trial in UK concluded that concomitant vaccination with one of two SARS-CoV-2 vaccines (ChAdOx1 or BNT162b2) plus an age-appropriate influenza vaccine raised no safety concerns and preserved [antibody responses](#) to both vaccines.

Vaccine composition

On 24 September 2021, WHO published [recommendations](#) for the components of influenza vaccines for use in the 2022 southern hemisphere influenza season:

Egg-based Vaccines

- an A/Victoria/2570/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Darwin/9/2021 (H3N2)-like virus;
- a B/Austria/1359417/2021 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus; and
- a B/Phuket/3073/2013 (B/Yamagata lineage)-like virus.

Cell- or recombinant-based Vaccines

- an A/Wisconsin/588/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Darwin/6/2021 (H3N2)-like virus;
- a B/Austria/1359417/2021 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus; and
- a B/Phuket/3073/2013 (B/Yamagata lineage)-like virus.

It is recommended that **trivalent influenza vaccines** for use in the 2022 southern hemisphere influenza season contain the following:

Egg-based vaccines

- an A/Victoria/2570/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Darwin/9/2021 (H3N2)-like virus; and
- a B/Austria/1359417/2021 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus.

Cell- or Recombinant-based vaccines

- an A/Wisconsin/588/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Darwin/6/2021 (H3N2)-like virus; and
- a B/Austria/1359417/2021 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus

On 26 February 2021, WHO published [recommendations](#) for the components of influenza vaccines for use in the 2021-2022 northern hemisphere influenza season:

Egg-based Vaccines

- an A/Victoria/2570/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Cambodia/e0826360/2020 (H3N2)-like virus;
- a B/Washington/02/2019 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus; and
- a B/Phuket/3073/2013 (B/Yamagata lineage)-like virus.

Cell- or recombinant-based Vaccines

- an A/Wisconsin/588/2019 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus;
- an A/Cambodia/e0826360/2020 (H3N2)-like virus;
- a B/Washington/02/2019 (B/Victoria lineage)-like virus; and
- a B/Phuket/3073/2013 (B/Yamagata lineage)-like virus.

It was recommended that the influenza B virus component of **both trivalent vaccine types** for use in the 2021–2022 northern hemisphere influenza season should be a B/Washington/02/2019-like virus of the B/Victoria-lineage.
